Decision Letter**

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This letter concerns your request for access to records held by the Ministry of Government and Consumer Services (MGCS) under the *Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act (FIPPA)*. We received your request on July 16, 2019, along with the \$5.00 application fee. Through subsequent conversations, we received your clarified request on September 16, 2019.

You requested the following records:

*All finalized transition material regarding ONBIS modernization from February 1, 2019 to September 1, 2019.*

A search has been conducted by MGCS and I am pleased to inform you that access is being granted in part to the responsive records. Sections 12, 13, and 18 (Cabinet records, advice to government, and economic and other interest of Ontario, respectively) have been applied to sever certain portions of the records.

Section 57 of *FIPPA* provides that fees shall be charged for certain costs associated with processing an access request (under Regulation 460 of *FIPPA*). The total fee calculated for processing your request is **\$47.50**, calculated as follows:

1. The first part of the document is a letter from the author to the editor of the journal. The letter discusses the author's interest in the topic and the reasons for writing the paper.
